## LETTERS FROM LEADERSHIP



The work of our rabbinical court includes providing loving support post conversion. Life after the actual conversion ritual sometimes feels more like falling off a cliff than reaching a destination. The community of Intro to Judaism classmates may disappear. Even with a Jewish partner, extended family, or congregation, many new Jews actually struggle with their new identity.

Our Torah instructs us to "love the ger" (the Hebrew word for convert), and our **Conversion Mentoring Program**, launched in November 2020, shows how to fulfill this mitzvah by ensuring ongoing dialogue and connection with another Jew-by-Choice. Our Post-Conversion Course for New Jews is another form of support that was offered for the third time in Fall 2022, with 9 participants. 2022 focused on strengthening mentoring and online learning to support "the whole journey" of those who commit to Judaism. With their creativity and passion, Jews-by-Choice continue to enrich and strengthen the Jewish community beyond measure.



I am very proud of the accomplishments of our Bet Din over the past year. Our Conversion Mentor Program has grown with the help of a Jews of Color Initiative Grant, and our board is exploring and considering the needs of our conversion candidates who do not fit traditional gender identities.

With the closing of the *Mikvah* on the campus of the American Jewish University at the end of September 2023, we are exploring alternatives including a more robust natural *t'vilah* option, which we began to offer extensively over the past 2 years due to COVID.

We offer our thanks to all who have financially supported our work, noting particularly that the funds raised at our Shavuot-season event honoring Rabbi Jerrold Goldstein enabled us to provide Shabbat starter kits for our new Jews. Finally, we note with sadness the death of Suzanne Gallant, whose generosity over the past years has greatly strengthened our work.

#### Conversions

Since our founding in 2002, we have converted **790** candidates, with an all-time high of **64** in 2022. We then help usher these new Jews into the community through our support programs.

#### Rabbis

We have over **115** involved rabbis, representing all major progressive traditions, including transdenominational movements. This ensures that our program meets the majority of conversion standards.

Through our **Conversion Mentor program, we offer New Jews a friend to guide you in that journey.** Whether you just need a listening ear or help deepening your practice, your mentor is there to support you through your first year as a Jew. Many of our mentors are also Jews-by-choice, so they understand what challenges you may face.



We also offer a post-conversion course for recent converts. Many Jews-by-choice hit a slump after their *Mikvah*. You've spent a year learning about Torah, rituals, holidays, and culture with your sponsoring rabbi, and now you don't quite know what comes next. The post-conversion course can help you continue to study texts, explore how to deepen your practice, and make friends with other new Jews.



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All rabbi members of SCCBD are invited to an annual Day of Learning (*Yom Iyun*). In-service training has consisted of continuing education on conversion topics such as:

- Hattafat Dam Brit and Brit Milah
- Issues in the Conversion of Children
- Transgender Folk in the Conversion Process
- Mikvah as a Contemporary Spiritual Practice

In 2022, our first hybrid *Yom Iyun* at Temple Beth Am focused on "Why Don't Jews Proselytize? One Question: Three Rabbis." 35 rabbis registered and 4 attended remotely.

Our three featured speakers gave the following lectures:

- Rabbi Lisa Edwards: I Don't Proselytize, I Invite; I Don't Convert, I Welcome
- Rabbi Joel Rembaum: ואהבם את הגר: First
  - Second Temple Notions of the Ger...It's Complicated
- Rabbi Dvora Weisberg: Do We Love or Fear Converts? Tensions in Rabbinic Literature



Rabbi support includes answering their questions about the nuances of conversion. For example, one rabbi wanted to know if there was a *mohel* who performed *Hattafat Dam Brit* on transgender men—there are, and we were able to connect the rabbi and candidate to one. Another wanted to know if we could provide a non-binary witness for a non-binary candidate—we found a non-binary volunteer from our extensive network. If our Executive Director cannot answer the question, we have the resources of our *Roshei Bet Din*: Rabbis Daniel Shevitz and Michelle Missaghieh.

### \$32,000 1-YEAR GRANT


Because SCCBD is committed to representing the diversity of the Jewish people, we received a one year grant to invite seven Jews of Color, who have chosen Judaism, to become a part of our Conversion Mentor Program and guide other people of color as they join the Jewish people. Some of the learning from this project was showcased at a web seminar co-sponsored by Rising Tide, the *mikvah* network sponsored by Mayyim Hayyim.

As our Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Consultant, Jill Housen was involved in securing this grant and working with SCCBD to help bring Jews by Choice of all backgrounds into the Jewish People. She was also a speaker in the aforementioned Rising Tide seminar.



The findings of the program prove that multiple entry points into the Jewish community are essential, especially for Jews of Color. The Jews of Color Mentoring program should be incorporated into Intro Judaism classes, Beginning Hebrew classes, and congregations to ensure we deliver on our commitment to building communities of belonging. Jews of Color are willing to step up and help new Jews despite the tremendous load we already carry. We are capable of stepping into leadership roles. The opportunities to lead need to be offered to us.
